STEP 3

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of this Power of our own understanding.

One of the first things my sponsor told me about Step 3 was that all I basically had to do initially was to “make a decision”; and somewhere down the line, I would turn my will and life over to my Higher Power. That since I had just completed taking Steps 1 and 2 and gotten a better understanding of the concepts of honesty and open-mindedness as they pertained to my powerlessness over gambling, I was ready to gain insight into the concept of willingness. That comparable to the experience I acquired in Step 2, I was in a better state of mind to trust that there was and is a Power greater than myself.

“Let go and let God” is a phrase I’ve heard often used in Gamblers Anonymous, and what I experienced in the time I’ve been in program is that it doesn’t mean I can just give things to God to handle. I must give them to God with a full surrendering of trying to control a particular situation. Letting go *of the outcome I desire* and letting God *show me his will* means I must acknowledge that there’s a presence and power beyond my understanding, ready to work through me as I let go.

The passing of my late wife, Sandy T., to cancer three years ago certainly presents challenges in my life. The feelings of doubt and old habit of anxiety surface, and I still go through the occasional periods of “why me?” and “poor me”, along with a sense of anger toward God. Although I have gratitude within my heart, I have a dull pain in my belly.

But the work I put in with my sponsor has paid dividends. I’ve begun to let go of trying to control the challenges, knowing that doing so doesn’t mean I’m not doing my part in the process. Instead, it means that I’m courageously facing these challenges with a new awareness of my partnership with God, the Power of my own understanding. It means that I’m beginning to accept that I can handle the loss of Sandy because of God’s spirit within myself. I’ve begun to now let go and let God handle it all, and by doing so, I’m able to make room within my heart for the presence of God and loving memory of Sandy.

I can just hear my sponsor reminding me of what Mother Teresa once said, “God will never give me more than I can handle. I just wish he didn’t trust me so much”.

Recently I went to my 5 year-old nephew’s birthday party at Chuck E. Cheese. After a few hours there, I’m reminded as an adult that I’d rather have a root canal than go to Chuck E. Cheese.

But I remember as I kid, I enjoyed running around Playland at the Beach, eating plenty of cotton candy and sipping Icees, celebrating birthdays with my grade school friends. Of course, I could have done without the huge stuffed teddy bears, but the seemingly unlimited sweets, snacks and soda made up for it.

I remember the countless trips to the Icee stand for yet another jumbo-size, brain-freeze cup of ice and sugar. “Let’s have suicide Icees!” one of my friends suggested. When I asked what those were, he looked at me as though I was a dumb 5th grader. “Well, you fill up your cup of Icee with a bit of each of the flavors,” he explained.

The idea of a suicide Icee sounded cool, so I gave it a try. From my first sip, I knew then that the suicide Icee would be the drink of my choice for the rest of our grammar school parties. After all, why have one-flavor Icee when I can have them all. Excess is best right?

For much of my life, I’ve filled my cup with as much as it could possibly hold. I’ve craved control over the things that made up my life’s unique flavor. I held my cup tightly to make sure that whatever I wanted got in, and whatever I didn’t want stayed out. I pretty much said yes to whatever came my way because if I said yes, that meant more control over something.

But things had a way of catching up to me, and after trying to add and control so many things, my cup became so full that it slipped right out of my hands. And suddenly I lost control. All I could do was watch as the Icee spilled and drenched all over me, leaving a foul scent of blueberry, strawberry, watermelon and tangerine.

Everything was out of my hands — literally.

After years of filling my cup with more, more, more and trying to control the matters of my life, I had to learn how to stop and let go.

Soda, or Icees, can be addicting. The sugar and the caffeine buzz tastes and feels so good. Who wouldn’t love it? The problem with addictions, however, is that if left unchecked, they can eventually kill you.

Although I’ve never been addicted to soda, I know I can easily be addicted to control. The satisfaction of having a say over how something turned out was sweeter to me than an Icee sugar buzz.

Or at least, that was until God stepped in. God has shown that if I want to find true satisfaction, serenity and joy, I have to let go of my cup — let the sticky Icee fall on the floor — so that I could be refilled with something better.

With the help of Step 3, I have come to understand and am convinced that deciding and learning to let go and let God guide me in my life is the best thing I can do for myself.

Note From I.S.O.: We only received a few letters this past month, so with permission from the G.A. members who authored the following submissions that were in the 2017 Fall Conference Booklet, we will anonymously be including these in this issue and hope that everyone enjoys reading them.

DON'T GIVE UP!

My first meeting at Gamblers Anonymous was in February of 2001, this was about 8 months into my gambling. In that short amount of time I was already gambling compulsively and losing paychecks and a lot of time with my children. Every free moment I had I wanted to spend at the casino. I was a slot machine player. I started out playing nickel machines, which over time escalated to high limit slot machines. I thought this was a great stress reliever, as I ran a company and was raising my two daughters alone. I really felt I deserved this great escape, so I became best friends with the slot machines. Very quickly it became the only thing I enjoyed anymore. Who wants to go to the movies or out to dinner or any other activity when you can be at the casino? Not me!!

I started skipping family gatherings, declining invitations from friends and was totally consumed with playing slot machines. I won quite a bit of money over the years and never left the casino with it. All the jackpots became ammunition to keep playing longer. My life spiraled out of control quickly, I would lose a lot of money, panic, go back to meetings, swear to myself I was never going to do it again and in a few days would end up back at the casino causing myself yet more misery. I kept coming in and out of the program, humbling myself with day one after day one. I knew Gamblers Anonymous was the only way I could stop gambling yet I didn't get a foothold in the program for years. I unfortunately did lose my home and retirement due to my wreck less gambling habits.

I now have over 3 ½ years of abstinence and a lot more serenity in my life. Getting involved in the program, attending meetings and the friendships I have established through Gamblers Anonymous over the years have been instrumental in my recovery. Abstaining from gambling has not made life's issues and problems go away, but I deal with them much differently today. I am so very grateful to Gamblers Anonymous for my new life free from the obsession to gamble.

If you're struggling to stay abstinent from gambling, don't give up, keep coming back, it works!

NO MORE GUILT

The pain was excruciating and I knew I couldn't handle much more. It was not a head pain or a heart pain, but a pain of guilt. I had been playing poker in Gardena for the past 18 years. My family and my job, then later my business had interfered with my gambling. I had put gambling before my family, friends, business or myself. Gambling was my true love. Although I loved my family with all of my heart they were definitely second in my life. It was March 31, 1983 and I looked up at the clock and it was 5 PM. I had been playing poker at the Horseshoe Club in Gardena for about 8 hours. I didn't bother to eat lunch and I wasn't particularly hungry for dinner. I had been winning all day. I was afraid to even leave the game to urinate for fear that my good luck would change. My jeans were getting a bit wet and I had to go real bad. At 5:30 they paged me for a phone call and I knew it was my wife. I had faithfully promised her I would be back to our retail store before the 6:00 closing. I got up to answer the page but instead ran for the men's room. I knew I had no more excuses to give her. I had been on Gamblers Anonymous for 7 ½ months but had fallen off 17 days previous. I had told her I was going to go back to a G.A. meeting that evening. My intention was to leave right then knowing that I could probably get to my store by 6:00, but as I headed back to my table to pick up chips, I had another adrenalin rush and found myself sitting to play a bit longer. I told myself if I lost the next hand I played in I would leave. As things might be I won that next hand and proceeded to continue playing.

Every half hour the chip girl came around for collection. In 1983 it cost \$6.00 per half hour to sit in the game I was playing in. I would tell her each time I was leaving but I just couldn't get up. Over the next couple of hours I was paged 3 more times. I continued to resist answering the page since I knew who it was and I was back on my winning streak. By 8:00 PM my eyes started swelling up. The player next to me commented about the tears dripping down my face. I told him the smoke was starting to get to me not wanting him to know that it was the guilt and not the smoke. Yes, I was crying but I was still winning. At 8:25 I won the biggest pot of the night and I yelled for the chip girl to bring me 3 racks to hold my chips. I stood up and told the dealer that I was really leaving now and to deal me out. As I put the chips by color in the racks I told the other players, many of which I had played with for years, that I was taking their money and they would never get it back since I knew then I was never coming back.

I got home that night to what I expected to be a bout with my wife. My first words to her were that I had won \$1,900.00 knowing that she could care less and that I went to a Gamblers Anonymous meeting and had no intention of gambling again. To my surprise there was no bout but silence, as I knew her thoughts were "We'll see".

I truly knew that night that gambling for me was like cocaine for a drug addict or whiskey for an alcoholic. I had wasted thousands of hours and thousands of dollars that could have gone to my family. I had so many fantasies and told so many lies to so many people that I could no longer function as a human being.

Here it is 34 years later and my life is really where I want it. I am retired now and have everything I always gambled to get. Yes, the guilt is finally gone and today I can function like a normal human being. I truly love my family, my friends, my fellow G.A. members, and my life.

SICK AND TIRED

My entire life I have felt alone, because I chose not to let people in my life. My home life was very dysfunctional; alcoholic father, and other dysfunctional things going on!!

I have dealt with a drug addiction which several times I came close to dying and finally quit my drugs, only by the grace of God, but went straight into gambling and just like my drugs, I went full force into gambling. I started with bingo and the horse races, which I LovedI got into every sport pool at work and of course would buy not one, but several square's. All I wanted to do was gamble on anything and everything.

I went through two marriages which both husbands were addicts. The Indian Casino came around and I found my Love!! I also loved the Slot machines. I gambled for close to 30 years, or more and I could Not Stop. Cleopatra became my best friend.

I started getting sick and tired "Of being sick and tired of gambling". I came into this program November 14, 2005 it was my best decision I have ever made. I no longer numb myself because I now have the tools to deal with Life.

I thank God and Gamblers Anonymous for giving me back my Life!!

MY MIRACLE IN A TOOTSIE ROLL

At the 2003 Fall National Conference in Irvine, California, I attended a workshop called "Miracles". I listened and became overwhelmed by the power of fellow member's stories of miracles. I began to reflect on my almost nine years of abstinence from gambling. My wife and I were putting our financial problems behind us, the family was still together and I was continuing to make amends where I could. All of this seemed impossible a few years ago. By following the guidelines of the Gamblers Anonymous and Gam-Anon programs, along with the

love and support of many members, our recovery was happening, one day at a time. This was all a miracle but was there a true miracle that had happened to me? As I continued to listen and absorb the miracle stories I realized that I too had a miracle story.

My wife and I watched our granddaughter Ellie (Eliana) and her brother ZZ (Isaiah) while our daughter worked as a teacher. Ellie, at three years old, became very ill. She could not eat or drink anything, as she would immediately throw it up. Day by day it became worse and she was very weak from not eating or drinking. The doctors gave her medicine but Ellie just stayed on the couch, or in bed, all day and night, while continuing not to eat anything. She could tolerate a few ice chips or sip a little water, but no food, not even a cracker. Each day we hoped and prayed for recovery but she just got weaker. After almost a week of this, at about 4:00 am, Ellie came to the foot of our bed. With a tiny weak voice all she asked for was a Tootsie Roll. As grandparents do, we keep treats for the grandkids in a cabinet in the kitchen. My wife just knew that if she went to that cabinet there would be a Tootsie Roll for Ellie. She looked and saw none, so she reached to the very back and there she found exactly **ONE Small Tootsie Roll**. What did that piece of candy cost, maybe 2 cents? What was it worth? Priceless, I would have paid anything at that moment. After 30 years of gambling, losing thousands and thousands of dollars, all that my granddaughter Ellie wanted was a Tootsie Roll, worth 2 cents and we had that for her. That was *my miracle*.

It is now October 2017 and Ellie is seventeen years old, a real sweetheart and doing just fine. The kitchen has been remodeled, but we still have a cabinet with some treats for the grandkids. We keep a small bag of Tootsie Rolls with one labeled *“for Ellie”*, just in case!!
